A BILL

To require a force structure assessment of the Cybersecurity
and Infrastructure Security Agency, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “CISA Force Structure
5 Assessment Act”.

6 **SEC. 2. CYBERSECURITY AND INFRASTRUCTURE SECURITY**
7 **AGENCY ASSESSMENT.**

8 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Director of the Cybersecurity
9 and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) of the Depart-

1 ment of Homeland Security shall conduct a force structure
2 assessment of the ability of CISA to fulfill its mission.

3 (b) ELEMENTS OF ASSESSMENT.—The assessment
4 conducted under subsection (a) shall include an assess-
5 ment of the resources and total number of personnel nec-
6 essary to carry out the mission of CISA, including an as-
7 sessment of whether all personnel have the needed training
8 and accredited, industry-recognized certifications for exist-
9 ing work roles and an assessment of the resources and
10 number of personnel currently available, as of the date of
11 such assessment, and if different, the resources and num-
12 ber of personnel necessary to carry out the responsibilities
13 of CISA, related to the following:

14 (1) The security of Federal information and
15 Federal information systems.

16 (2) The security of State, local, Tribal, and ter-
17 ritorial governments.

18 (3) The collection, analysis, and utilization of
19 reports made pursuant to section 2242 of the Home-
20 land Security Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 681b).

21 (4) CISA's role as a Sector Risk Management
22 Agency and the national coordinator for critical in-
23 frastructure security and resilience, in accordance
24 with section 2218 of the Homeland Security Act of

1 2002 (6 U.S.C. 665d) and National Security Memo-
2 randum 22 (or any successor document).

3 (5) The security risks and capabilities presented
4 by emerging technologies, including artificial intel-
5 ligence and quantum computing.

6 (6) The facilitation of cybersecurity and critical
7 infrastructure security cooperation with international
8 allies and partners.

9 (7) The development of plans for cyber defense
10 operations, in accordance with section 2216 of the
11 Homeland Security Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 665b).

12 (8) CISA's ability to conduct threat hunting op-
13 erations on Federal information systems and oper-
14 ational technology.

15 (9) The operation of the Joint Cyber Defense
16 Collaborative.

17 (10) CISA's ability to—

18 (A) support the cybersecurity and oper-
19 ational resilience of operational technology used
20 by government and non-government entities;
21 and

22 (B) provide external support to critical in-
23 frastructure operational technology.

24 (11) CISA's role in cybersecurity asset response
25 activities, pursuant to section 2202(c)(1) of the

1 Homeland Security Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C.
2 652(c)(1)) and Presidential Policy Directive 41 (or
3 any successor document).

4 (12) The operation of the Alliance of National
5 Councils for Homeland Operational Resilience –
6 Critical Infrastructure.

7 (c) CONSULTATION.—In developing the assessment
8 conducted under subsection (a), the Director of CISA shall
9 consult with relevant stakeholders, including the heads of
10 other Federal departments and agencies, Information
11 Sharing and Analysis Organizations, sector coordinating
12 councils, and State, local, Tribal, and territorial govern-
13 ments.

14 (d) SUBMISSION OF ASSESSMENT.—Not later than
15 one year after the date of the enactment of this Act, the
16 Director of CISA shall submit to the Committee on Home-
17 land Security of the House of Representatives and the
18 Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Af-
19 fairs of the Senate a report detailing the results of the
20 assessment required under subsection (a), including rec-
21 ommendations to address any shortage of resources or
22 personnel or gaps in relevant training or accredited, indus-
23 try-recognized certifications for existing work roles, identi-
24 fied by such assessment.

25 (e) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

1 (1) ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE.—The term “ar-
2 tificial intelligence” has the meaning given such
3 term in section 5002 of the National Artificial Intel-
4 ligence Initiative Act of 2020 (15 U.S.C. 9401).

5 (2) INFORMATION SHARING AND ANALYSIS OR-
6 GANIZATION.—The term “Information Sharing and
7 Analysis Organization” has the meaning given such
8 term in section 2200 of the Homeland Security Act
9 of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 650).

10 (3) INFORMATION SYSTEM.—The term “infor-
11 mation system” has the meaning given such term in
12 section 3502 of title 44, United States Code.
